Memphremagog Conservation's Patrol: 50 years of evolution and protecting the lake's environment

Magog, May 12, 2022 – The patrol team has begun this week its 50th summer season on Lake Memphremagog and will crisscross the lake from May to September. Founded in 1972 on the initiative of Mr. Graham Taylor, MCI's patrol has greatly evolved since its beginnings. Originally, the team (composed of young residents of the lake) was mainly responsible for cleaning the lake's shoreline of the lake from the waste that accumulated there. Today, the patrol is made up of students or university graduates from the fields of environment and ecology who carry out many complex scientific projects.

The year 2022 at the MCI

This year, the patrol will focus particularly on monitoring and controlling aquatic invasive alien species that threaten the biodiversity and ecosystems of Lake Memphremagog. Species targeted include zebra mussel, Chinese mystery snails, Banded mystery snail and Eurasian watermilfoil. Well-established zebra mussel populations were first observed in Lake Memphremagog in 2018 and are now threatening municipal and residential water intakes. To make the increasing number of boaters on Lake Memphremagog aware of this situation, the patrol team will distribute a new pamphlet on good boating practices, which includes an interactive map on navigation, as well as being present on the lake and at boat ramps.

This year again, the patrollers are collaborating with various partners to monitor the quality of the lake's water, its tributaries, its shoreline and any cyanobacteria blooms, as well as carrying out various studies on the lake.

The patrol is coordinated by Frédérique Thibault-Lessard, Bachelor of Environmental Studies. The other members of the team are Fanny De Blois, a biologist, Eric Phendler, an undergraduate student in ecology and environmental sciences at Bishop's University, as well as Sarah Carroll, holder of a Bachelor's degree in geography from Concordia University and a graduate degree in Coastal Ecology from Coast Mountain College.
