MCI prioritizes the protection of natural landscapes

Magog, June 16, 2023 – Memphremagog Conservation (MCI) held its 56th annual general assembly on June 3rd in the Chapel at Southière-sur-le-lac in Magog. It was an occasion to remind ourselves of the importance of MCI's mission for present and future generations. Johanne Lavoie, volunteer president of the organization since 2022, stated that: 'more than ever, MCI's priorities for the coming years will be the protection of natural landscapes. The state of Lake Memphremagog indicates that it is not immune to changes in the climate. The constant presence of cyanobacteria, the impact of exotic invasive species and the presence of the Coventry landfill site at the head of the lake are a clear indication of the impact of humans on the lake'. MCI monitors these issues closely and offers concrete solutions to remedy them. These actions were presented by the President, the General Manager, and the project leaders.

Priority to natural landscapes

During the assembly, conferences given by MCI's main partners in conservation clearly showed that Lake Memphremagog and its watershed are at the heart of wildlife corridors needed to maintain biodiversity and the quality of the lake's water. MCI is pleased to highlight its national partner, **The Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC)**, represented by Cynthia Patry; its regional partner, **Appalachian Corridor**, represented by Caroline Bisson; and its local partner, **Memphrémagog Wetlands Foundation (MWF)**, represented by Judy Hopps. These conferences reinforce the importance of collaboration between the various conservation organizations, as well as MCI's essential role in the preservation of natural landscapes in Lake Memphremagog's watershed. And with only 9% of the watershed protected when the Québec and Canadian governments have an objective of protecting 30% of their territory by 2030, there is still a lot of work to be done! MCI would particularly like to thank all of the owners of natural landscapes who have joined us in the protection of the watershed by creating protected areas on their property.

Robert Benoit awarded the Gordon-Kohl prize for 2023

During the AGA, Robert Benoit, noted environmentalist and ex-president of MCI, received the prestigious Gordon Kohl prize for 2023 for his exceptional contribution and personal commitment to the protection of the environment for the benefit of present and future generations. In presenting the prize, Mrs. Lavoie stated: Rare are those, like Robert, who stood up to defend the common interest against the individual good. It is a noble gesture to place the common good above oneself. His involvement in the fight to save the Mount Orford national park and the negotiation of the moratorium on the treatment of leachate from the Coventry landfill site are only a part of his legacy to the organization, the population of the region and to future generations. Robert is a great source of inspiration to MCI, as evidenced by the extended standing ovation he received from the members. He remains on the Board of Directors of MCI but hopes to reduce his involvement over the next year.
