Memphremagog Conservation (MCI), Magog's La Ruche high school's CFER and the city of Magog join forces to revegetate the shoreline of the Club Memphré

Magog, June 11, 2024 – As part of the Action Bandes riveraines project, Memphremagog Conservation (MCI), La Ruche high school's Centre de formation en entreprise et récupération (CFER) Memphrémagog, the city of Magog, and the members of the Club Memphré, an association of homeowners on Lake Memphremagog, joined forces to revegetate Club Memphré's shoreline.

Johanne Lavoie, volunteer president of MCI stated: «I hope the presence of all these young folks from La Ruche high school and their teachers working for the environment on Lake Memphremagog will inspire shoreline residents to take action! MCI is pleased to work with the Club Memphré in this more than symbolic gesture. It goes without saying that MCI is thrilled to be working with the city of Magog on this exciting project and others in the future »

Project description

MCI is hoping to redouble its efforts to mobilize shoreline residents to restore their shoreline buffer zones on Lake Memphremagog and its tributaries. The ecological roles played by these zones are well known: they reduce erosion, filter nutrients, cool the shores and protect fauna and their aquatic habitats. Beginning last year, MCI initiated the Action Bandes riveraines project, led by Chanel Racine-Mineault, MCI project manager. This year, after designing landscaping plans for several properties, six revegetation projects on Lake Memphremagog's shores took place in Austin, Magog, Stanstead Township and Potton Township. The revegetation of Club Memphré's shoreline took place on June 5th, involving the planting of 300 plants in their buffer zone. Since the beginning of the project, more than 5,300 plants and more than 70 native species were planted on 263 metres of shoreline (863 feet) on Lake Memphremagog.

MCI hopes to invite more shoreline residents on Lake Memphremagog and its tributaries to join the movement and ensure that their shorelines are planted with a mix of grasses, shrubs and trees, this to protect the flora and fauna, as well as the quality of the lake's water for future generations.
